### From Justice to Reconciliation:

### A Jesuit Response to the Refugee Crisis in the Middle East

19 Oct | 4:30 – 5:30 PM | Rehm Library

Over 13 million people have been forcibly displaced by the crisis in Syria since 2012, and over 4 million people need humanitarian assistance in Iraq because of the ISIS/ ISIL military activity since 2014. These combine

to form the largest forcibly displaced population in the world since the Second World War. Ten years into these crises, there is no clear direction toward return. In this talk, former Holy Cross Chaplain Rev. Dan Corrou, S.J., Regional Director of the Jesuit Refugee Service in the Middle East (Iraq, Jordan, Lebanon and Syria), will describe humanitarian approaches to the crises and the JRS mission of accompaniment—a model for the work of reconciliation based in the 500-year Ignatian tradition of cura personalis. In Absence, 2018 USA Fellow, Oscar nominee, and five-time GRAMMY®winning trumpeter & composer Terence Blanchard celebrates both the brilliance of jazz master Wayne Shorter's legacy and the inspiration he has given Blanchard, influencing his ever-expanding amalgam of music and storytelling.

For this monumental task, Blanchard unites his internationally acclaimed band The E-Collective, featuring young musical pioneers Charles Altura on guitar, Fabian Almazan on piano and synthesizers, Oscar Seaton on drums, and David "DJ" Ginyard on bass, with the double-GRAMMY®-winning Turtle Island Quartet. The album ABSENCE, celebrating the music of Wayne Shorter, will be released by Blue Note in late August.

### Refugees, Prisoners of War, and Foster Kids: A Long History of Child Taking

The Border policy of taking children of migrants to get them to withdraw their petitions for an asylum hearing became sharply politicized in 2018 and 2019, with many suggesting that the Trump administration was uniquely cruel. In this talk, Laura Briggs, Professor of Women, Gender, and Sexuality Studies at University of Massachusetts Amherst and an expert on U.S. and international child welfare policy, will argue that on the contrary, from Indian Wars to the Cold War to the War on Drugs, the U.S. federal government under both Democratic and Republican administrations has taken children for political ends. It has also consistently engendered opposition, from the 19th century to the present. Briggs is author of "Taking Children: A History of American Terror" (University of California Press, 2021). ### Bill T. Jones/Arnie Zane Company: Afterwardsness

"The music is live and largely elegiac, the dancing, virtuosic and mostly abstract though flecked with gestures of vulnerability, pain and anger" -Brian Seibert, The New York Times

In the psychoanalysis of Sigmund Freud, afterwardsness is "a mode of belated understanding or retroactive attribution of sexual or traumatic meaning to earlier events... "

Jettisoning the sexual component and emphasizing the notion of "trauma," this awkward though evocative term comes very close to describing Jones' state of mind when offered a commission to create a socially-distanced work at this particular collective moment. In some ways, the title parodies Jones' (and many others') desire to have reached an end point to our twin pandemics: COVID-19 and and on-going violence against

The piece has been constructed quickly and within the constraints and uncertainty of social distancing. Afterwardsness engages a retrospective dimension from choreographic assignments given to the dancers during their isolation. The dancers studied archival videos and learned phrase material stretching back 40 years and no longer in the company's repertory. Musical Director Pauline Kim Harris, in collaboration with composer/ vocalist/instrumentalist Holland Andrews, created a composite score that includes Kim's original work 8'46"—an homage to George Floyd—as well as compositions by Andrews and company members, Vinson Fraley, Jr. and Chanel Howard. Following the work's retroactive logic, the score also includes a conscious excerpting of Olivier Messaien's great war-time composition Quartet for the End of Time.

### Politics in the Name of Lord Rama in Narendra Modi's India

Kalpana Jain, an award-winning journalist and senior religion and ethics editor at The Conversation US, will discuss how politics is being reshaped in India and religious sentiments are being mobilized under Prime Minister Narendra Modi. She will illustrate how the Bharatiya Janata Party, India's pro-Hindu nationalist ruling party, has used the image of Hindu God Rama to whip up religious sentiments to its advantage and unite Hindus.

Jain has written extensively on Hindu nationalism, poverty, gender issues and healthcare in India. As a Pulitzer Center grantee, her project on "Hindu Nationalism, Its Toll, and India's Inter-Faith Resilience" explores the effect of Hindu nationalism on Indian society through the live's of women and millennials.
